### November is Young Workers' Month

As we approach Young Workers' Month, we wanted to write and thank you for being one of our young activists. Your contribution to UNISON's work is vital, and never more so as we come under attack from a government hell-bent on ripping the heart out of trade unions.

### Our priorities for Young Workers' Month

This year our top priorities for Young Workers' Month are campaigning for a real Living Wage, and raising the issue of how too many young workers are becoming subject to mental health problems at work. And, of course, we will use these issues to show why union membership and organisation is important and to encourage more young workers into membership.

Overleaf you can find out what you can do to help make Young Workers' Month a success. But before you get to that, we would like to tell you why mental health among young workers is a particular priority for us.

### Young workers' mental health

It began when we started hearing individual stories of young members who were stressed at work and went on to become ill as a result of that stress. They talked about their workloads; they talked about bullying; and they talked about low pay and lack of training. But they also told us about how little support they had from their employers – and how that made their health even worse.

And we believe this is because mental health issues are not openly discussed, are subject to misunderstanding and often are simply ignored until it becomes too late.

Yet one in four people will experience mental health problems in any given year. And the problem is growing among young workers.

Our job as a union is to raise awareness of the issue with our members and employers; to negotiate with employers for proper policies and practices; and to support our members.

We are committed to this, and that's why we have made it a priority for Young Workers' Month. But that doesn't mean we can forget about it at the end of November. We know it is work that will have to continue, and we hope you will join us in making sure it is raised right across the union.

Once again, thank you for your commitment and support.
