



How to get there

By air

Liverpool John Lennon Airport has a range of domestic flights.

A taxi from the airport to the ACC Liverpool will take

approximately 20 minutes or the express bus service Route 500

will take approximately 25 minutes, dropping you off within a

five-minute walk of ACC Liverpool.

By rail

Avanti West Coast runs direct services from London Euston to Liverpool Lime Street (with a journey time of just over two hours). Other long-distance rail services also operate into Liverpool Lime Street.

ACC Liverpool is a 20-minute walk from Lime Street or a short taxi ride. You can also transfer at Lime Street onto the underground Wirral Line trains to James Street station (10-minute walk) or catch the CityLink bus which runs every 12 minutes as a circular service around the city centre and stops at both Liverpool Lime Street and ACC Liverpool. https://www.nationalrail.co.uk

By coach

By road

From the North

Approaching from the north, leave the M6 at junction 26 and follow the signs for M58 Liverpool. Follow to the end of the M58 and then take the signs for A59 Liverpool. Continue to follow the Liverpool City Centre signs until picking up signs for the Waterfront. The Kings Dock Car Park and all other on-site parking is signposted Waterfront on the available spaces signs that are found across the city.

From the South

Approaching from the south, leave the M6 at junction 21A and take the M62 to Liverpool. At the end of the M62 follow the signs for Liverpool City Centre along Edge Lane, picking up and following the signs for The Waterfront. The Kings Dock Car Park is signposted Waterfront on the available spaces signs found across the city.

From the Wirral

From the Wirral, Wales and the M53, leave the M53 motorway at junction 3 signposted Birkenhead and follow the A552 for the Birkenhead (Queensway) tunnel and Liverpool City Centre. The Kings Dock car park and all other onsite parking is signposted "Waterfront" on the available spaces signs found across the city.

Venue information

You will enter the ACC Liverpool on the cityside, Galleria level. Most of conference is found on the lower level with a few rooms on the upper level. Both levels are accessed by escalators and lifts.

All credentials require a current passport size photograph as stewards cannot allow anyone to enter the conference hall without one. If you require a photograph for your credentials, you can upload this via our online conference system. If you let us know, we can print your badge and send it to you prior to conference or come to the conference desk and we will print you a new badge.

Personal pronouns

It is now possible to add your personal pronouns to the online conference system so that they can appear on your credentials. For information on how to do this, please visit the UNISON website, click on events, choose your conference and scroll down to the documents at the bottom of the page. If you require help, please email the conference team, conferences@unison.co.uk or telephone, 0207 121 5123. If you let us know, we can print your badge and send it to you prior to conference or come to the conference desk and we will print you a new badge.

Multi faith prayer rooms

The multi faith prayer rooms are shared spaces for prayer and quiet contemplation and are available for all delegates to use. Please contact the conference desk for further details.

Toilets

Gender-neutral toilets will be available on the upper level, cityside.

First aid

If you need first aid assistance, please speak to a member of the ACC Liverpool team, one of the UNISON conference stewarding team or the conference desk. The first aid rooms are found on the Arena side of the building and stewards will be able to escort you to these rooms. Alternatively, first aid assistance can be called to your location in the building.

Safety and Security

Safety for everyone attending conference is a key priority for UNISON. We regularly review our safety and security procedures and have in place a number of security measures to make conference as safe and secure as possible. Whilst at conference, it is important to take precautions to minimise potential risks and safeguard yourself. You will need to wear your credentials in the venue but remember to take them off when you leave. Keep your belongings close and secure whilst in the venue and report any unattended bags immediately to the venue staff or UNISON staff member. No bags may be left in

the conference hall during lunchtimes and any unattended bags will be removed.

Please familiarise yourself with the nearest fire exits, at the venue and your hotel. In the event of an emergency, please follow the venue's or hotel's instructions.

If you require a Personal Emergency Evacuation Plan and have not already requested one, you can do on the Online Conference System (OCS) via My UNISON.

You can also register your emergency contact details on OCS via My UNISON.

4. Essential information for delegates

Key figures at conference

The president of the union presides over conference and chairs all the debates. The two vice-presidents may deputise for the president.

With the co-operation of delegates, conference business is processed quickly and without great formality. There are occasions, however, when the president will need to exercise their authority including the right to make a ruling on a question of standing orders or a point of order. The president's ruling is final.

The president also has the authority to take action in respect of any delegate in response to any behaviour which is deemed to be inappropriate or unacceptable (for example causing a disturbance and refusing to obey the call to order, interrupting a speaker, engaging in behaviour which is insulting or otherwise disrespectful either at the conference, or at any official event connecting with conference or on social media). The president may delegate the exercise of this authority. This authority includes issuing the delegate with an informal warning, preventing them from speaking in any debate or motion, a

temporary removal of credentials for all or part of the conference, or otherwise expulsion from conference. Where appropriate, consultation and discussions will take place with the relevant regional delegates. Such behaviour may also be dealt with under the union's disciplinary procedures.

National Executive Council members sit on the platform together with the general secretary and the assistant general secretaries. They are called on to move reports, statements, motions, amendments to rule and amendments in the name of the National Executive Council. They will also speak for the National Executive Council in reply to some of the debates.

Standing orders committee chairperson, vice- chairperson and secretary come to the platform on a daily basis to give reports on behalf of the standing orders committee.

Conference procedures

Details of conference procedures can be found in the conference documents 2023 booklet together with texts of the motions, amendments and amendments to rule.

Delegates' credentials

Each delegate has been issued with a delegate's credential and this should be visible at all times while you are in the conference venue. Delegates who have their credentials do not

need to register at the conference desk before entering conference.

Credentials include a unique bar code which can be read by a hand-held scanning system. This assists with verifying attendance and monitoring fair representation and proportionality among delegates speaking at the rostrum.

Shared delegations

Shared delegations help to meet the criteria of fair representation and proportionality. Shared delegations mean that a branch can elect two delegates who will share the delegate place on a 'job share' basis.

Sharer 1 will receive the delegate badge in their conference pack and Sharer 2 will receive the visitor badge.

It is important that you know who you are sharing a seat with as you will need to arrange to meet at conference in order to swap badges at least once.

Both Sharer 1 and Sharer 2 badges must have the names and photographs of both sharers on them. If there is a photograph missing, both sharers should come to the conference desk on arrival where a photo can be taken and replacement badges issued.

The Sharer 1 badge is the delegate badge and allows access to the conference floor to sit in the delegate seat and vote on the motions. The Sharer 2 badge is the visitor badge and allows access only to the visitor gallery to watch the proceedings. Sharers cannot be on the conference floor together at any time.

Both Sharer 1 and Sharer 2 badges will allow access into the conference venue but only Sharer 1 badge will allow access onto the conference floor.

Sharers should contact each other and decide which sessions to attend as the delegate. Sharers should then arrange to meet to ensure the delegate has the correct colour badge.

If you have the Sharer 1 delegate badge but you are leaving the conference early, you must hand this badge to the other sharer or leave it at the conference desk on your departure so the other sharer can pick it up and use it for the remaining sessions.

Access to the conference hall

The UNISON stewards on the doors are volunteers and adhere to a strict brief to assist the smooth running of conference. If you are not wearing proper credentials with a photograph you will not gain access to any part of the conference hall. These stewards will also operate the scanning system on the badge bar codes each time a delegate enters the hall.

Reducing our impact on the environment

As a trade union with strong environmental policies we need to keep paperwork to a minimum. We provide delegates with the opportunity, via the online conference system, to opt out of being sent paper copies of our conference materials. All these documents are available online via the conference app or the conference website. We will only print the minimum number of documents required. Once these documents have been distributed no further replacements will be available. Please make sure you retain your documents for the duration of conference. Recycling bins are located around the venue.

Conduct of delegates

All delegates, visitors, staff and facilitators are expected to behave in a courteous manner. Aggressive, offensive, intimidatory, disrespectful or unacceptable behaviour will not be tolerated. This applies to all aspects of communication, at or in connection with the conference, including postings on social media. Complaints will be treated seriously.

The president has authority to take action in response to any complaint received or of their own initiative in respect of any delegate whose behaviour is deemed to be inappropriate. This authority includes issuing the delegate with an informal warning,

preventing them from speaking in any debate or motion, excluding a delegate from all or part of the conference, or otherwise expulsion from conference. The exercise of the president's authority is separate from any decision to deal with the behaviour under the union's disciplinary procedures.

As trade unionists we do not expect any of these problems to arise. However, your regional secretary and regional representatives are available in the first instance for advice and support at this conference. Issues of unsatisfactory conduct by anyone attending conference can also be raised with the conference desk.

Filming and photography at UNISON conferences

UNISON's conferences are a key part of our democracy.

Delegates are able to make their voices heard and to vote on the policies which will govern our union's policy and campaigns.

As such, we want all our members to know about conferences and how important our democratic systems are – we believe this is an important part of being an open, democratic organisation. However, we also value the privacy of our members. National Delegate Conference and Local Government Conference are filmed on behalf of UNISON. This footage provides a vital record of conference for internal use;

and some footage may be used on our website to promote UNISON and our democratic processes.

UNISON accredited photographers may be taking pictures of the main debates, fringe meetings and other public areas at all UNISON conferences. These photographs may be used in the union's publications for members or on our website, social media sites e.g. Facebook and Twitter, to promote the union. If you do not wish to be filmed or photographed:

- refuse if you are approached for an individual photograph or video interview
- sit in the identified 'no filming zone' whilst in the conference hall
- if you speak in a debate inform Rostrum Control you do not wish to be filmed.

If you are planning to use a camera at conference (with or without voice recording) for the purposes of using the images and/or sound on behalf of the union, whether employed by UNISON or as an activist who may be using the image in a branch, regional or sector newsletter:

 always ask an individual for their consent and explain the use of the picture e.g. these images may be used by UNISON in our own publications or on our website to illustrate conference when it involves a large group – images of a delegation or the
whole of the conference floor etc – you clearly cannot seek
individual permissions. Instead, a statement will be posted at
conference explaining that the event will be
photographed/filmed and individuals who object to being
included in this will be told who to speak to in order to resolve
their concerns.

Recording at Conference

No recordings of any sessions during the Conference including conference sessions and fringe meetings should be made without informing the Chair of the session and the agreement of all those present.

Flash photography

The national disabled members' committee has indicated that flash photography can cause visual impairment and disorientation and interferes with signed communications.

Therefore the national executive council has decided that there will be no flash photography at National Delegate Conference.

No smoking

A no smoking policy exists within the ACC Liverpool. This includes e-cigarettes.

5. Access and facilitation

UNISON recognises the importance of, and accepts responsibility for, making conference as accessible as possible. All delegates have had the opportunity to register for provision of services to make the conference accessible to them.

UNISON staff member, Helena Dias, is the conference access officer. Questions about access and facilitation should be addressed to her via the conference desk.

If you have registered your email address for the conference, you will receive an email with all details of how to access and use the app.

The small print

All posting and usage of the app must be in line with the UNISON Rule Book and Terms of Service of the App developer. Everyone should use social media safely and responsibly and

follow the guide to conduct in the "Working Together" menu of the app. Any attendee at the conference will be able to view photos and comments put up via the app, so be careful what you post and don't name or post photos of people without their permission.

If you see content that you don't think is appropriate, report it and it will be referred to UNISON staff acting as moderators. UNISON staff reserve the right to remove any content from the app or to ban any app user not following UNISON rules or otherwise misusing the app and their rights within it.

7. Health and safety information

Making UNISON conferences a healthy and safe environment

UNISON has in place a health and safety policy which applies to all the activities that it undertakes, including the organisation and administration of all its conferences.

UNISON is committed to its responsibility to provide delegates, sharers, visitors, and staff to conferences with a healthy and safe environment. UNISON will comply with all health and safety statutory requirements and codes of practice, as well as our own policies and procedures.

To fulfil its commitment to ensuring that our conferences are healthy and safe environments UNISON works closely with representatives of its staff, venue management, contractors, and all service providers. In the event of any health and safety issues and problems arising, these should be directed immediately to a member of staff or raised directly with the conference desk.

Throughout conference UNISON continually monitors the venue and its environs, often in conjunction with a staff health and

safety representative, to maintain and ensure a healthy and safe environment.

Accidents/injuries/near misses

Please report any accidents/injuries/near misses to the conference desk, where they will be recorded on an incident record and investigation form. Where appropriate, these will be investigated, and the necessary remedial action will be undertaken.

Evacuation procedure

A pre-recorded message will be played before the start of each conference session, with a summary of the evacuation procedures detailed on a large screen. Please take the time to familiarise yourself with this information.

ACC Liverpool emergency procedures

- in the event of an emergency the following announcement will be made: "Attention please – Attention please! We have an emergency within the building. Please leave by the nearest available exit! Do not use the lifts!"
- please leave the building follow all instructions given by
 ACC Liverpool staff

- do not wait to collect personal belongings (e.g. coats, handbags) and do not wait around for others
- do not run or panic move swiftly but calmly
- close the door if you are the last to leave the room you are in
- proceed to the assembly point on the piazza outside the restaurant near Leonardo's Hotel – this is necessary so everyone can be advised to return to the building when the emergency is over
- delegates with access requirements will be guided to the nearest refuge point by a venue steward, where they will receive further assistance
- no one is to return to the building until official announcements have been made by ACC Liverpool

Campaigning for a National Care Service: Learning lessons and developing our vision

UNISON supports the development of National Care Services and has been campaigning in Scotland, Wales and England to achieve this. The bill that the Scottish Government introduced to the Scottish Parliament in June 2022 wasn't fit for purpose and posed huge threats to our members. UNISON Scotland have been at the forefront of a campaign to get the SNP government to think again and has secured a pause in the bill to allow for further dialogue. In Wales UNISON secured from the Welsh Government a Project Board on Eliminating Profit from Looked After Children's Services and the convening of an expert panel to 'make practical recommendations to the Minister to work towards the establishment of a National Care Service, free at the point of use and publicly delivered'. The UNISON Wales/Cymru APSE report envisions an NCS delivered via local government. April 2023 saw the launch of UNISON's campaign for an NCS in England. In all nations progress has not been as swift as is hoped for and there have been significant challenges

and threats. So how do we secure the NCS that we need and workers can have confidence in? Come to the fringe and join the discussion to advance our positive visions for a National Care Service worthy of the name.


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
